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Course Goals:

Hello, all! In English 1020, students will embark on a semester-long sequence of research, reading, discussion and writing culminating in the creation of an 8-10 page document engaging real-world issues and addressing an authentic audience.

English 1020: "Science and Technology" will include readings that explore facets of science and technology. These sections are open to students of any major. Researching and writing projects may relate to any debatable topic that falls under the umbrella of science and technology. Examples include topics such as: social media's effect on socialization, space travel, video surveillance and invasion of privacy, digital literacy, how technology contributes to political polarization, etc. This broad genre is not meant to be limiting, but to provide us with a manageable scope to work with for the semester.

Students will learn to organize and develop the main points necessary to advance the purpose of a persuasive essay. Students will learn to write a standard MLA formatted research paper that meets the basic standards for scholarly research. Students will also learn to plan, organize, compose, revise, and edit their own writing. **Students must pass English 1020 with a "C" average or better in order to proceed to sophomore level English classes.**

Students that do not demonstrate sufficient writing capabilities, or whose writing shows consistent patterns of major grammatical errors, will not pass the course.

Each paper assignment will have different, specific grading criteria. Detailed assignment sheets will be provided. Read all instructions for all assignments, including discussions carefully!

Late Work Policy:

Most initial posts will need to be 100-200 words.

In order for a response to your peers to be considered substantial enough for credit, it should be clear, well-written and at least 75 words unless otherwise indicated.

3. Willful plagiarism is unacceptable and will result in a failing grade for the course.
