Course Information

Course Description

This course is designed to provide an introduction to the basic concepts, principles, and theories of the science of psychology. Topics included are biological and developmental processes, perception and awareness, learning and thinking, motivation and emotion, personality and individuality, adjustment and mental health, and social behavior.

Course Purpose and Goals

This 3-credit hour course is designed to provide you with a greater knowledge and understanding of the basic principles of psychology. Objectives for this course include 1) providing a broad overview of the field of psychology, with an emphasis on the science of psychology and how psychology applies to and impacts each of us in our daily lives; 2)

obtaining a greater knowledge of psychological principles as well as of human behavior and motives; 3) the development of scientific values and skills as well as an appreciation of scientific methods (especially as they pertain to psychology); and 4) learning how to evaluate, discuss, and critique information, becoming more intelligent consumers of information, and becoming independent thinkers.

Course Learning Objectives

At the conclusion of this course, students will:

- 1. Have a basic understanding of research design and the scientific method.
- 2. Have a basic understanding of the differences between biological, cognitive, developmental, and social components of psychology.
- 3. Gain an understanding of the major theoretical contributions to psychology.
- 4. Have a basic understanding of the brain and the nervous system.
- 5. Have a basic understanding of broad groups of psychopathology.
- 6. Have a basic understanding of basic learning principles.
- 7. Have a basic understanding of major theories of personality and their empirical support.
- 8. Have a basic understanding of at least two major types of treatment for psychological disorders.

Participation

Assignments and Submission Guidelines

I'm Here Post (10 points): After you have attended the first class, reviewed the syllabus, and navigated our D2L site, you are required to complete the "I'm Here Post" in D2L. Directions detailed in D2L.

Chapter Quizzes (130 points): For each chapter, you must complete an online quiz on D2L to show that you have completed the required reading. There are 13 multiple choice quizzes, each worth 10 points. You may take each quiz up to 2 times, and your highest grade out of your 2 attempts will be recorded in the gradebook. Though you do not have to take the quiz 2 times, it is highly encouraged that you do, as they are designed to help you master the material in each chapter. These are open-book/open-note quizzes, but since you have 2 attempts available, I would suggest that you try to take the quiz without the book/notes at least once, because this can help you learn the material more successfully.

Reflection Paper (20 points): This paper will provide the opportunity to reflect on course content and apply it to your own life. More specific requirements will be available in D2L. This assignment must be submitted to the Reflection Paper Dropbox.

Important note: When you turn in your paper to the D2L drop box, D2L will send you a confirmation email. You should check to make sure you receive a confirmation email whenever you turn in an assignment to the D2L drop box. In addition, KEEP THIS EMAIL in case you need proof that you turned in the assignment to the D2L drop box.

Cumulative Final Exam (40 points): The final exam covers material from the entire semester. The final exam will be taken on D2L and is open-note/open-book. Students will have two attempts available, and the highest score will be recorded.

Late Assignment Policy

No late work will be accepted for this class. Students are provided an adequate amount of time to complete coursework (quizzes, paper, and final exam). While I recommend starting on coursework sooner rather than later (**do not wait until the last minute**), I understand unforeseeable events may occur. Please let me know if there are any extenuating circumstances that should be considered.

Research Requirement

To aid in the understanding of the science of psychology, each student is **required** to complete a research portion of this course. You may complete this requirement in one of two ways:

- 1) Participate in studies currently being conducted by researchers in the department of psychology. Computer sign-up for the studies you may participate in is located at http://etsu.sona-systems.com. After you create a username and password, you may browse through the studies being offered and sign up for different studies. Experiments conducted in a laboratory are worth substantially more credit than online surveys. Please note that online and lab-based studies are added to Sona throughout the semester. Participation in Sona studies must be completed by 11:59pm on Friday, December 3rd. To view a Sona tutorial, visit https://www.youtube.com/watch?v= 10nT2ZU600.
- 2) Fulfillment of this research requirement may also be accomplished by completing summaries of empirical research articles. To complete the research alternative, please see the instructions and articles posted on D2L. Alternate assignments must be completed by **11:59pm on Tuesday, November 30**th. If you are not 18 years or older you must complete the alternate assignment for the research requirement for this course.

Fulfillment of the research requirement may also be accomplished by completing a combination, or mix, of participation in Sona studies and summaries of empirical research articles.

Each student must earn a total of <u>5</u> research credits. Failure to complete this research requirement will result in a deduction of 1% point from your final grade for the course for each ½ credit you are deficient. For example, if your final grade for the course was 90%, but you only earned 4.5 research credits, 1% would be deducted from your final grade resulting in an 89%. If you were to only earn 2 research credits, 6% would be deducted from your final grade resulting in an 84%. If you did not earn any research credits, 10% would be deducted from your final grade resulting in an 80%. For further

Extra Credit

Once you have completed the research requirement, you may earn up to **10 extra credit points** (5%) for the semester by participating in additional psychology studies in SONA or by doing the research alternative (article summaries). As with the research requirement, extra credit must be completed by 11:59pm on Friday, December 3rd.

You are required to complete 5 Sona credits (see Research Requirement section above) and can complete up to 5 *additional* credits for extra credit. Each SONA credit that you receive after your required 5 credits is worth 2 extra credit points. For example, if you complete 7 total Sona credits, then you'll earn 4 extra credit points (7-5 required Sona credits = 2 Sona extra credits = 2x2 = 4 extra credit points). If you earn all 5 extra Sona credits (for a total of 10 points toward your grade), you can improve your grade by 5% (aka move from an 85% to 90% etc).

Grading Policy

Over the course of the semester, students will have the opportunity to earn 200 points (not including extra credit).

Your final grade will consist of the following:

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I'm Here Post = 10 points (5%)
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Chapter Quizzes = 130 points (65%)

Reflective Paper = 20 points (10%)

Cumulative Final Exam = 40 points (20%)

Research Requirement [Has effect on final grade; See "Research Requirement")

Your grade = Total number of points achieved + extra credit points / 200
