DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE

This course is a general survey of World literature that covers Japan, India, Pakistan, the Czech Republic, China, Nigeria, Ghana, Sudan, Egypt, Canada, and Australia. Although we will cover a variety of literary genres and periods in this class, it is not going to be possible for us to read/discuss every single literary work included in the anthologies. The purpose of this class is to help you appreciate literature from diverse cultures. To achieve this goal, we will start the semester by reviewing the literary terms used in the discussion of literary texts. Moreover, we will overview the basic principles and schools of literary criticism.
