CLASS DESCRIPTION:

From catalog: "An examination of surface-based art in relationship to 2-D design (line, shape, texture, value, and color), contemporary process, and research-based practice. Stress is placed on visual thinking and the conceptualization through the use of problem-solving structures."

Additionally: This studio-based course introduces students to a broad range of contemporary forms of art making relative to surface-based media. Curricula incorporates visual and critical thinking with formal and experimental projects. Students are exposed to a wide variety of historical and contemporary models of artistic production, participate in the Core Connect thematic programming, and learn how to utilize research methods that will be essential to their future studies and artistic practice. COURSE OBJECTIVES: The overall objective is for each student to comprehend and utilize the skills and concepts presented in class to create unique, complete pieces of work. Students will develop an understanding of vocabulary relevant to the **Elements and Principles of Design**, including:

Unity
Emphasis/Focal point

COURSE GOALS:

- To develop a grasp of two-dimensional concepts and become familiar with the elements and principles of design
- To develop methodologies of experimentation and process that will produce complex and original art forms
- To develop your own critical thinking skills and become acquainted with vocabulary and critical analysis through critique participation and written explorations
- To hone technical skills, craftsmanship, and presentation of work
- To explore historical and contemporary examples of design in conjunction with the CORE theme

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS: This online course is taught using a variety of instructional methods including demos, lectures, class discussion, and project creation.

SKETCHBOOK: Each student is responsible for maintaining a sketchbook for this course. You'll be required to complete sketches for each project, and explain the thought process behind your ideas. I'll be checking

sketchbooks in the early stages of each assignment to provide feedback, and when projects are turned in. I recommend that you keep reference images and inspiration in your sketchbook.

PROJECT/ASSIGNMENTS:

This course will have at least 4 major assignments/projects, and a number of smaller projects. Students will be given ample time to complete the assignments/projects. Much of class time will be dedicated to the production of the work, but students will need to allot some time outside of class to complete any unfinished work.

CULTURE CARD: All students taking Core studio I & II need to fill out one Culture Card per semester. Artist lectures and exhibitions can be used for your cards. Students are expected to attend five art-related/culture events and write a 75-word reaction to the event. I'll make sure to update class when relevant events are happening and add them to the class schedule. Because this class is online, students are not required to attend events in person, but instead, may engage with culturally significant events online such as: artist talks, online museum events, etc.

ATTENDANCE

Students can miss up to 3 classes without it adversely affecting their final grade. A letter grade deduction (from the final) will occur for every absence after 3. Students are expected to be on time, remain in class for the duration, and be engaged in work for the course. Failure to follow these parameters will negatively affect a student's final grade. Any work missed during an absence is the student's responsibility to make up.

To succeed in this course, students must be in class and engaged. **Demonstrations will be done at the beginning of class, and cannot be repeated.** A handout or video will most often accompany demonstrations and projects. This will cover only the basics of each project. Students are expected to pay careful attention, and take additional notes. ASK QUESTIONS!

Attendance during the final is mandatory. Failure to attend will result in a lower grade.

BFA PORTFOLIO REVIEW:

Students interested in the BFA program of study should retain all completed artwork for the BFA Portfolio Review at the end of your sophomore year or beginning of your junior year. This review is required for entry into the BFA program. For the review you must have at least 10 strong pieces showcasing your understanding of the material covered in all 4 foundations courses, along with other work from your 2000 level coursework. For more information on the BFA portfolio review see the handout checklist available on the ETSU Art and Design website, and/or speak with your area advisor. An informational meeting for all BFA candidates taking the review will be announced each semester. Completed artworks may also be used in applications for departmental scholarships.

GRADING

Grades are determined by several factors:

- -Completion of work assigned/adherence to expectations of the given assignment
 - -Quality of the work (craftsmanship, conceptual basis, etc.)
- -Participation in class discussions and critiques
- -Growth and development over the semester
- -Attendance
- -Respect for other students, the class, and the space

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Prepare to spend a minimum of 6 hours outside of class per week to complete the work assigned.

Critiques are the art world's "exams". Missing a critique is serious and will affect a student's grade negatively. Critiques cannot be made up, and the feedback during a critique is valuable and necessary to a student's success in this course.

No extra credit will be offered. Plan accordingly.

D2L & ZOOM

Students are expected to check D2L regularly. All official communication will come through D2L, your official ETSU e-mail, and Zoom.

MATERIALS

Some materials will be provided in this course (through use of the course fees), while others will need to be purchased by the student.

We will discuss materials and where to acquire certain items in greater detail for each project/before the end of the first week. Students will be given adequate time to gather materials.

Please contact me if you have issues obtaining materials or have run into an obstacle you feel I should know about.
