Course Objectives

Among the specific objectives are to:

- 1. Acquire a familiarity with the breadth and depth of the Western cultural heritage,
- 2. Gain a greater appreciation for the connections with our own aesthetic and ideological conditions—both societal and individual,
- 3. Learn the basic concepts important to the study of culture (Art, Music, Architecture, Religion, Technology, and Ideas),
- 4. Gain the skills in the critical evaluation appropriate to this endeavor.

Instructional and Evaluation Methods

1. Thirteen Chapter Tests will be given covering the material discussed in each Chapter of

- the text. These tests will have any combination of definitions, matching, fill-in-the-blanks, true/false, multiple-choice. Each test has 30 randomly selected questions (from the textbook), and you will have 60 minutes to complete it. The tests will comprise 70% of your grade. All Tests close at 11:30 p.m. on the date listed on the Syllabus/Schedule. At the end of the semester, I will replace your lowest test score with 100%.
- 2. The Papers that you will turn in for each Module (such as, Virtual Field Trips, and Readings from REH) will count as Class Participation. These papers will be worth 20% of your grade. These papers must be uploaded into their individual Dropboxes D2L. The Syllabus/Schedule list the due dates for each Module; all submissions are due in their Dropboxes by 11:30 p.m. on the date listed in the Syllabus/Schedule—please note that you can always add late work to its original Dropbox, but it will **count for half**. Each paper must be at least one page, double-spaced (not counting the title, assignment info, name, pictures, Works Cited, etc.). It is standard for the papers to be written in 12 point font—if you use larger font in order to meet the paper minimum, I will download your paper and change it to 12 point font and then grade accordingly. The easiest way to ensure the proper length is to add a separate title page. See Paper Directions under Content. These assignments must be written in your own words as much as possible and have properly cited quotations (should you use any). Changing a few words here-andthere, but otherwise leaving strings of words identical to the original is not enough for it to be "in your own words." Please be aware that each Dropbox is connected to Turn It In. Plagiarized papers will be penalized up to and including a grade of zero, and they cannot be made up.
- 3. The remaining 10% will come from the Final Exam. This will be a written exam where you will have several questions to choose from (if you write on the same topic as one of your Virtual Field Trips, you must significantly change and/or expand your focus). The Final is found under "Content," after Module 13. The Final must be turned into the Dropbox by 11:30 p.m. on the date listed in the Syllabus/Schedule. Write on only one of the 3 possible questions. Papers must be written in your own words as much as possible and any quotes used must be properly cited. Plagiarized papers will be penalized up to and including a grade of zero, and they cannot be made up.

Assignments

<u>Papers</u>: Write at least one full page of text, double-spaced—excluding: names, titles, assignment information, dates, bibliographical information, and pictures (see Paper Directions under Content). Be sure to address the topic of the Assignment (selected Readings from REH; or the period pertaining to the Chapter for Virtual Field Trips), and define any terms used. Some Assignments require examples to be attached, you can simply include the web address if you don't know how to do this or if the file is too large you can attach it in the message you include with your submission (please note that the example does not count towards the page-minimum). Upload *all* assignments to their appropriate Dropboxes in D2L (even if they are late). I have purposely left the questions to be answered vague—this is your class, so you should feel free to interpret the assignments in a way that is meaningful and interesting to yourself. I will deduct points for papers that are less than one full page of text. *Papers must be written in your own*

words as much as possible and any quotes used must be properly cited. Plagiarized papers will be penalized up to and including a grade of zero, and they cannot be made up.

*Please note: you can upload Late Work to its original Dropbox any time during the semester. If you had a technical issue or some form of emergency, please explain in the comments section for each submission.

<u>Virtual Field Trips</u>: You may search a website (Museums are a great resource!) or find something in Films On Demand related to the material discussed in each Chapter of the text (instructions for accessing Films On Demand can be found in D2L); these must reflect the time-period of the chapter. I have many students who use the Virtual Field trips to do research in a particular area (such as art, medicine, technology, etc.). Write at least one full page, double-spaced, discussing what you learned during your virtual field trip—excluding: names, titles, assignment information, dates, bibliographical information, and pictures (see Paper Directions under Content). Please be sure to upload it to the appropriate Dropbox in D2L. The Schedule/Syllabus list the due dates for all Module Assignments; Dropboxes close at 11:30 p.m. *Papers must be written in your own words as much as possible and any quotes used must be properly cited. Plagiarized papers will be penalized up to and including a grade of zero, and they cannot be made up*.

*Please note: if you encounter problems while you are attempting to upload your papers (which, unfortunately, does happen), just keep trying until you are successful and include a note in the Comments section describing the problem; I will not penalize you if your papers are late due to a technical issue! I will not grade papers that have been emailed; they must be uploaded to their Dropboxes in D2L.

<u>Tests</u>: All of the material for the tests comes directly from the textbook. Test questions will be given in random order, no back-tracking will be allowed, and the tests will be timed. Respondus is not needed. If you get locked out of a test before you complete it, try to log back in, but remember the clock will continue to count down—even while you are trying to log back into the test. Each test has 30 randomly selected questions, and you have 60 minutes to complete it. If you have trouble, please contact me immediately; more than likely, I will need to reset the Test. Please be sure to use a strong internet connection while taking a test!

*Please note: you have two opportunities to make up missed Tests. Email me the Test number when you are ready to take the Test, and I will reset it for you. Be sure to include your name and class; emails do not always include your name and do not indicate which class you are in.

Final Exam: There are three essay Questions to choose from. Select ONE and write a 2-3 page paper. Upload to the Dropbox by 11:30 p.m. on May 5^{th} . Papers must be written in your own words as much as possible and any quotes used must be properly cited. Plagiarized papers will be penalized up to and including a grade of zero, and they cannot be made up.

*Please note: the Final Exam questions are listed after Module 13.

Extra Credit: You may complete up to THREE additional assignments (either Virtual Field Trips or Readings that we did not use in any of the Modules—create your own question to discuss), in the same manner as described above. Each extra credit assignment will count for an additional 1% (added to your overall total at the end of the course). If you complete more than one, each submission must come from a different time period—in other words, a different chapter topic. Please upload these to the Extra Credit Dropbox (you may submit all three to the same Dropbox). Write at least one full page, double-spaced, discussing what you learned for the Extra Credit—excluding: names, titles, assignment information, dates, bibliographical information, and pictures (see Paper Directions under Content). The Extra Credit Dropbox will close at 11:30 p.m. on May 5th. Papers must be written in your own words as much as possible and any quotes used must be properly cited. Plagiarized papers will be penalized up to and including a grade of zero, and they cannot be made up.
