# **Course Description**

The purpose of this course is to increase each student's musicianship and enjoyment of performance through the study of literature for various trumpet ensembles. Emphasis will be given to intonation, rhythmic accuracy, dynamics, style and overall ensemble playing.

## Learning Goals/Objectives

- To develop the areas mentioned above at a rate consistent with or above the expectations of your course registration level.
  - Level I (1211) students are Freshmen and Sophomores. They will be expected to properly prepare their parts for performance and contribute to the overall goals of the ensemble.
  - Level II (3211) students are Juniors and Seniors who have performed in the ensemble for more than two semesters. Level II students are expected to perform satisfactorily on the first and solo parts, conduct sectionals as needed, assist lower division students with any rehearsal or performance problems and assist the conductor in program preparation, etc.

## **Required Text(s) and Supplies**

All music will be provided. Students may be expected to retrieve and print parts via D2L, Google, or email.

## **Attendance Policy/Grading**

If you are enrolled in Trumpet Ensemble, it is essential that all players attend every rehearsal. All parts must be covered in chamber music, and our rehearsals are ineffective if you are absent; *every single part is important!* Excused absences (significant illness, family emergencies, etc.) will be accepted ONLY if I receive advance notice. Each unexcused absence will lower your final Trumpet Ensemble grade by 1/2 letter grade. Grading will be based on individual musical progress and contributions toward the performance goals of the entire ensemble.
