Information and Guidelines

Foreign Language Courses 1010-2020

The Syllabus represents an agreement between the Department of Literature and Language and its students. You indicate acceptance of these policies by registering for this course.

VERY IMPORTANT:

A MINIMUM GRADE OF C- (70%) IS REQUIRED IN ANY FOREIGN LANGUAGE LEVEL 1010, 1020, 2010, AND 2020 TO BE ABLE TO ADVANCE TO THE NEXT LEVEL FOREIGN LANGUAGE CLASS. A STUDENT WHO EARNS A D+ (69%) OR BELOW CANNOT PROGRESS TO THE NEXT LEVEL.

Department of Literature and Language Students in French, German, or Spanish with <u>no</u> <u>experience</u> in a foreign language are encouraged to register in 1010. Students with <u>prior</u> <u>experience</u> in a foreign language should complete the Foreign Language Placement Exam to determine their level. Email the Spanish Program Coordinator, Liv Detwiler (detwiler@etsu.edu), for a link. Once you complete the exam, you will receive instructions on how to obtain a permit into the appropriate course.

Department of Literature & Language Attendance Policy: The Department of Literature & Language advises attendance at all class meetings. Bear in mind that class attendance affects the quality of one's work in a course and, ultimately, the quality of one's college degree. The Department of Literature & Language does not distinguish between "excused" and "unexcused" absences and, therefore, has established a maximum allowable number of absences:

<u>Fall and Spring Policy</u>: no more than nine absences on MWF schedule, no more than six absences on MW and TR schedule, no more than three absences on evening schedule, students who leave midway through an evening class will be marked absent for 0.5 classes.

<u>Summer Policy:</u> no more than five classes on the MTWRF schedule, no more than two classes on the MR evening schedule.

Students exceeding the limitations will receive an F or a W if within the University policy on dropping a course. Students who are tardy when roll is taken will be counted absent. Grading within the allowable number of absences is left to the instructor's discretion.

ETSU honor code: East Tennessee State University is committed to developing the intellect and moral character of its students. To that end, all instances of plagiarism, cheating, and other forms of academic misconduct shall be punished in accord with Tennessee Board of Regents Policy. Any knowledge of conduct of this nature should be reported to the proper authorities. Not reporting instances of academic misconduct represents a fundamental break with honor code policy, and although this offense is not punishable, reflects a callous disregard for yourself, your classmates, and your professors.

Students who violate University rules on academic dishonesty are subject to disciplinary penalties. Penalties for academic misconduct will vary with the seriousness of the offense and may include, but are not limited to, a grade of F on the work in question, a grade of F for the course, reprimand, probation, suspension, and expulsion. For a second academic misconduct offense, the penalty is permanent expulsion.

Students with disabilities: The University provides, upon request, appropriate academic adjustments for qualified students with disabilities. Any student with a documented disability (physical or cognitive) who requires academic accommodations should contact the Disability Services in Nell Dossett Residence Hall, third floor, telephone 439-8346, as soon as possible to request an official letter outlining authorized accommodations. Before course accommodations can be made, a faculty accommodation form from the DS must be presented to the instructor. E-mail policy: Every student is assigned an ETSU e-mail account. Although students may choose to forward university e-mail to an external e-mail account, they are responsible for all information, including attachments. Students are expected to check e-mail on a frequent and regular basis in order to stay current with University-related communications, recognizing that certain communications may be time-critical. It is recommended that e-mail be checked daily, but at a minimum, twice per week.

Course goals and expectations: The courses of the Lower Division share the goal of leading students toward competency in language and culture. As you progress through the two-year program, you will develop your ability to understand and use a foreign language in a variety of contexts. You will always be expected to prepare the lesson <u>before coming to class</u>: study the pages assigned, do the assigned homework, listen to the corresponding lab files, learn vocabulary and verb forms, and so on. <u>In class, you must be prepared to practice</u> the skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Your instructor will ask you to work in pairs or groups often. This is because we believe it is a great way for you to practice and learn.

Grades: Your grades will be kept in numerical form until the end of the semester, when they will be averaged to determine the final letter grade: A = 93-100; A-= 90-92; B+= 87-89, etc. Your final grade will be based on your actual performance, not your effort or the sympathy of your instructor. You will not receive a passing grade simply because you complete all requirements. To earn an "A", all or most of your work must be excellent. A grade of "B" indicates that your work is good. A "C" means that your work is adequate and you may continue with the next course.

Incomplete: Incomplete(s) may be given with approval of the course coordinator only and solely in case of emergency or extenuating circumstances. To be eligible to receive an incomplete, the student must have completed at least 80% of the coursework as explained in the syllabus (this includes attendance and participation).

Final examinations: Each course will have a comprehensive final exam which ALL students must take. Because the department adheres to the University's final exam schedule, YOUR FINAL EXAM MIGHT FALL ON THE LAST DAY OF FINALS. For this reason, DO NOT LEAVE TOWN UNTIL AFTER THE LAST DAY OF THE FINAL EXAM PERIOD and make all necessary arrangements to take your final. Be advised that situations of inclement weather can alter the final exam schedule.

Resources for all courses: Good bilingual dictionaries are available at the University bookstore and other bookstores, as well as in the main office of the Department of Literature and Language in Burleson. An instructor approved online dictionary is www.wordreference.com. Your instructor and his/her handouts, supplementary grammar videos, and/or PowerPoints found in D2L are also excellent resources.

Student Conduct

Students must conduct themselves in a manner which is conducive to learning for themselves and for others in the class.

Make-up policies: Make-ups are allowed at my discretion. You must arrange to make up a missed quiz or test <u>as soon as possible</u>.

The most productive way to study a language is to spend a little time with it each day, rather than cram everything in at the end of the week or before a test. If you study each day, you will practice it shortly after learning it. Constant contact is crucial to language learning. A good rule of thumb for inclass/outsideclass time spent is 1 hour of class time, 2 hours outside class.

This will be a FAST-PACED course focused on material of increasing difficulty. Your instructor will do his best to cover all material and allow for sufficient practice, but you also have a part to play, i.e. being prepared for class, keeping up with deadlines, and initiating contact with your instructor in a timely manner if you need extra help with anything.

ATTENDANCE NOTE

Because language learning is a <u>cumulative process</u>, mastery of the language is more likely achieved by attending <u>all scheduled classes</u>. Therefore, attendance is <u>required</u> and is closely monitored. Students are allowed or disallowed to hand in course work late and/or makeup tests and quizzes in accordance with the East Tennessee State University Class Attendance Policy, described in the ETSU Student Handbook.

Each student is responsible for all work missed during an **excused or unexcused absence**. Please note that tardy written homework or any other scheduled assignment may **not be accepted** by the instructor or may not receive full credit. *Printed below is the departmental attendance policy*.
