COURSE POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS

ASSIGNMENT DETAILS

Introduction Speech (10 points)

You will be asked to prepare and deliver a 1-2 minute speech introducing yourself to the class and answering the question prompts provided by your instructor.

Fact Speech Assignments (150 points)

Fact Speech Topic (20 points)

You will be asked to submit two speech topics written as fact propositions for instructor approval.

Fact Speech Outline (30 points)

On the same day you deliver your speech, you will be asked to submit a final draft of your speech outline, including references in APA format.

Fact Speech (70 points)

You will develop, research, and deliver a fact speech. Prior to giving this speech, you will submit and receive instructor feedback on your topic selection and outline. This speech will be 4-5 minutes long and must include verbal citations of 3-4 reliable sources. Details of how the speech will be graded will be provided to you in advance.

Fact Speech Peer Evaluations (30 points)

You will be asked to complete an evaluation form for two of your classmate's fact speeches.

Value Speech Assignments (200 points)

Value Speech Topic (20 points)

You will be asked to submit two speech topics written as value propositions for instructor approval.

Value Speech Outline (30 points)

On the same day you deliver your speech, you will be asked to submit a final draft of your speech outline, including references in APA format.

Value Speech (70 points)

You will develop, research, and deliver a value speech. This speech should demonstrate the implementation of instructor and peer feedback following the fact speech assignment. Prior to delivering this speech, you will submit and receive instructor feedback on your topic selection and outline. This speech will be 4-5 minutes long and must include verbal citations of 4-5 reliable sources. Details of how this speech will be graded will be provided to you in advance.

Value Speech Peer Evaluation (30 points)

You will be asked to complete an evaluation form for two of your classmate's value speeches.

Value Speech Self-Evaluation (50 points)

You will be asked to write a 1-2 page reflective paper on your experience developing and delivering the value speech.

Policy Debate (135 points)

Policy Debate Topic Submission (20 points)

You will be asked to confer with your assigned debate partner and opposing team on potential debate topics. Each group member will contribute one of four potential debate topics for instructor approval.

Policy Debate Outline (30 points)

You and your debate partner team will be asked to submit <u>one copy</u> of the final draft of you case outline, including references in APA format.

Policy Debate (75 points)

You will participate in a live debate. You and your debate partner will present and argue your case, engage in a cross examination of the opposing team's arguments, and provide a rebuttal to the opposing team's examination of your case. Details of how this assignment will be graded will be provided to you in advance.

Peer Contribution Form (10 points)

You will be asked to complete a confidential short report that summarizes your debate partner's contribution to your debate preparation.

Lecture Quizzes (150 points)

You will be asked to complete a total of five quizzes on D2L. Quizzes will remain open until midnight on the day they are scheduled and will allow for two attempts, with the highest grade achieved being the one assigned. Failure to complete a quiz before the deadline will result in an automatic zero.
