Course Information

Course Description

This course is designed to provide an introduction to the basic concepts, principles, and theories of the science of psychology. Topics included are biological and developmental processes, perception and awareness, learning and thinking, motivation and emotion, personality and individuality, adjustment and mental health, and social behavior.

Course Purpose and Goals

This 3-credit hour course is designed to provide you with a greater knowledge and understanding of the basic principles of psychology. Objectives for this course include:

- 1) providing a broad overview of the field of psychology, with an emphasis on the science of psychology and how psychology applies to and impacts each of us in our daily lives;
- 2) obtaining a greater knowledge of psychological principles as well as of human behavior and motives;
- 3) the development of scientific values and skills as well as an appreciation of scientific methods (especially as they pertain to psychology); and
- 4) learning how to evaluate, discuss, and critique information, becoming more intelligent consumers of information, and becoming independent thinkers.

Course Learning Objectives

At the conclusion of this course, students will:

1. Have a basic understanding of **research design** and the **scientific method**.
2. Have a basic understanding of the differences between **biological, cognitive, developmental, and social** components of psychology.
3. Gain an understanding of the major **theoretical contributions** to psychology.
4. Have a basic understanding of the **brain** and the **nervous system**.
5. Have a basic understanding of broad groups of **psychopathology**.
6. Have a basic understanding of basic **learning principles**.
7. Have a basic understanding of **organismic** versus **environmental** influences on behavior.
8. Have an understanding of the distinction between **psychologists** and **other mental health professionals**.
9. Have a basic understanding of at least two major types of **treatment for psychological disorders**.

Dropbox Assignments

There will be **10** in class assignments throughout the semester, worth 15 points each, which will be worth a total of 150 points. These may include group or individual work on activities that are meant to supplement major topics.

Podcasts & TED Talks

In addition to readings, I have also provided links to ten podcasts (which range from about 30 minutes to about 50 minutes each in length) which you are expected to listen to throughout the semester. These podcasts may go into detail on chapter readings, they may present alternative theories, or may provide real world examples of chapter materials in everyday life and are meant to supplement chapter readings and class discussions. Due dates can be found below on the course outline each podcast/ TED talk will have a worksheet to go with it that will need to be turned into the appropriate dropbox.

Quizzes:

There will be **10** quizzes on D2L for each chapter covered during the semester. Reading quizzes will be due **before class** on the first day we cover the corresponding chapter (due dates are listed on the course schedule). Each reading quiz is worth 25 points, with the two lowest ones being dropped, totaling 200 points. These quizzes can be found on D2L under the tab "Reading Quizzes" and are multiple choice questions with a fifteen-minute time limit to complete and only two attempts are allowed.

Research Requirement

To aid in the understanding of the science of psychology, each student is **required** to complete a research portion of this course. You may complete this requirement in one of two ways:

- 1) Participate in studies currently being conducted by researchers in the department of psychology. Computer sign-up for the studies you may participate in is located at

<http://etsu.sona-systems.com>. After you create a username and password, you may browse through the studies being offered and sign up for different studies. Experiments conducted in a laboratory are worth substantially more credit than online surveys. Please note that online and lab-based studies are added to Sona throughout the semester. Participation in Sona studies must be completed by **11:59pm on Friday, December 4th**. To view a Sona tutorial, visit <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=10nT2ZU6QQ>. Please also see the Sona Participant User Manual posted to the D2L site for this course.

2) Fulfillment of this research requirement may also be accomplished by completing summaries of empirical research articles. Computer sign-up for the alternative assignment is located at <http://etsu.sona-systems.com>. After you create a username and password, you may sign up to complete multiple article summaries. Please see the instructions posted on the D2L site for this course regarding completing the research alternative. Alternate assignments must be completed by **11:59 on Wednesday, December 1st**.

Fulfillment of the research requirement may also be accomplished by completing studies on Sona and by completing summaries of empirical research articles. That is, you may do them in combination to complete the research requirement.

Each student must earn a total of 5 research credits. Failure to complete this research requirement will result in a deduction of 1% point from your final grade for the course for each ½ credit you are deficient. For example, if your final grade for the course was 90%, but you only earned 4.5 research credits, 1% would be deducted from your final grade resulting in an 89%. If you were to only earn 2 research credits, 6% would be deducted from your final grade resulting in an 84%. If you did not earn any research credits, 10% would be deducted from your final grade resulting in an 80%. Testing Policy

There will be a total of 5 exams throughout the semester that will cover major learning objectives. Exams are cumulative and will be given online through the D2L course website. Exams can consist of multiple choice, short answer, or a combination thereof; which will be decided by the instructor. Exams are worth 100 points each, and students will be allowed to drop the lowest graded exam at the end of the semester or choose not to take the final exam. Thus, the final exam is the only opportunity to make up an exam for any reason (e.g., to improve a poor exam grade, or to make up a missed exam).

Late and Missing Submission Policy

Late work may be accepted if you have contacted me and have provided an explanation. I understand that this is a difficult time and deadlines may not be the easiest to meet. Assignments will still have due dates because research shows they help students set goals and create schedules to reach those goals. However, flexibility will be shown to those who need it.

Otherwise, due dates are known in advance; therefore, a **10% penalty per day** (24 hours from the time the assignment was originally due), including weekends will be given. If you submit the wrong assignment, an assignment for another class, or a broken or unreadable document and do not fix it before the assignment is due, there will be a late assignment deduction. When turning in an assignment that is late, students should not email it to the instructor; please submit late work to the corresponding Dropbox folder for that assignment.

Extra Credit

The class period before an exam will consist of a game of Jeopardy to review concepts of items that might be on the exam. Students will divide into teams with the first, second, and third place teams receiving extra credit points for the upcoming exam. Also, students can participate in extra SONA research studies for extra credit (With a maximum of 6 SONA studies TOTAL)
